NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

DECEMBER 31, 2008

NOTE A: Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

Nature of Business

Paradox, Inc. (The "program") is a tax exempt 501 (c)(3) organization incorporated January 2, 2003. The objectives of the Program are to provide video graphic services to religious organizations and provide devotional and worship opportunities, spiritual counseling, and vocational training to artist. The Program is supported mainly by fees for services and donations.

The Program's headquarters is located in Crofton, Maryland.

Cash Equivalents

For purposes of the statement of cash flows, the Program considers all unrestricted cash and other highly liquid investments with initial maturities of three months or less to be cash equivalents.

Property and Equipment

Property and equipment is stated at cost and is being depreciated using the straight line and declining balance methods over estimated useful lives of five to ten years. There are no limitations on the Paradox's use of the property and equipment.

Financial Statement Presentation

The presentation of the Programs' financial statements have been prepared to comply with Statement of Financial Accounting Standards (SFAS) No. 117, Financial Statements of Not-For-Profit Organizations. Under SFAS No. 117, the Program is required to report information regarding its financial position and activities according to three classes of net assets: unrestricted net assets, temporarily restricted net assets and permanently restricted net assets. The accrual basis of accounting has been used.

Income Taxes

The Program is a not-for-profit organization exempt from taxes under Section 501 (c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code. The Program is subject to income taxes on non-related business income.

Functional Allocation of Expenses

The costs of providing the various programs and other activities have been summarized on a functional basis in the statement of activities and functional expenses. Accordingly, certain costs have been allocated among the programs and supporting services benefited.

NOTE A: Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (continued)

Use of Estimates

Management uses estimates and assumptions in preparing these financial statements in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles. Those estimates and assumptions affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities, the disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities, and the revenues and expenses.

NOTE B: Concentration of Credit Risk

Concentration of Credit Risk for Cash Held in Bank

The Program maintains cash balances in banks, which are insured by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation up to \$250,000. At December 31, 2008 the Program has no uninsured balances.

NOTE C: Accounts Receivable

Accounts are charged to bad debt expense, as they are deemed uncollectible based upon a periodic review of the accounts. For the year ended December 31, 2008, no allowance for uncollectible accounts was considered necessary.

NOTE D: Contributed Services and Materials

The Organization's programs are furthered through the contribution of time by a number of unpaid volunteers. The value of this contributed time is not reflected in the accompanying financial statements as the value of such services is not objectively determinable.

NOTE E: Subsequent Events

The Organization signed a lease in February 2009 to rent space to conduct program services. The one year lease requires payments of \$48,000 for a one year period.
